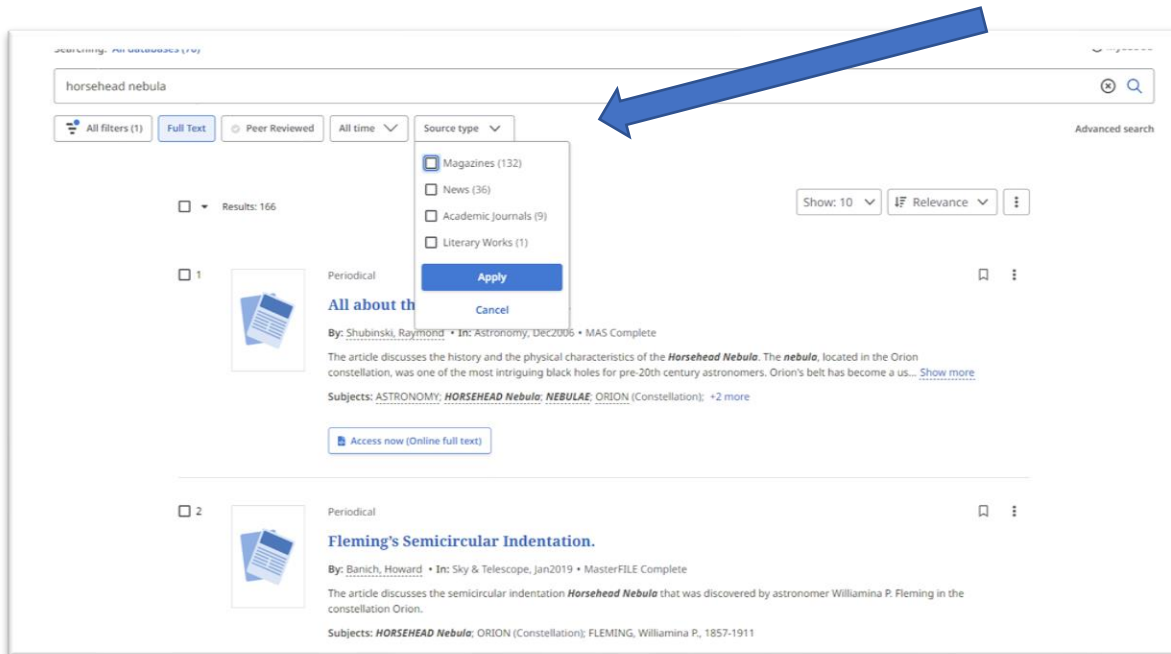
1. Go to www.alvincollege.edu/library
2. Click on **The Ebsco Databases**: username: **texshare-0203** and password: **TSL_DoNotUpdate!24su** (copy and paste is best)

Simply type in your search term here:

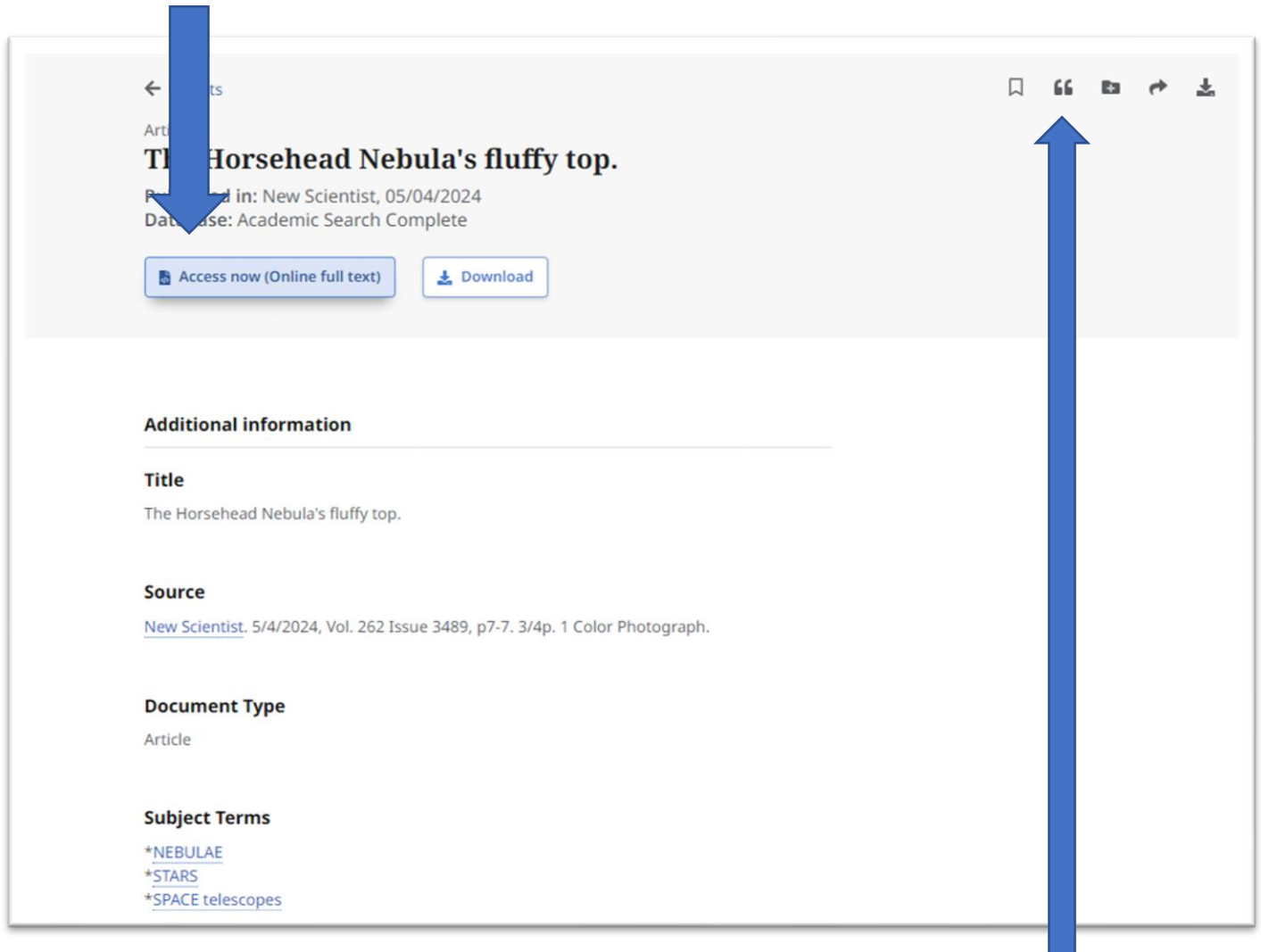
There is an easy menu to manage the results of your search here:
